- Both lists are an aggregate of observations from the two groups of observers (B.I. and Afar).
- A note of caution: when counting at a bird feeder it is the most reliable/conservative to count the number of a species seen at any one time. Observations in Gray are deemed to be a double observation and are therefore not counted in the list. Care should be taken to not over count by tallying the cumulative number seen.
- [Things in brackets are notes by me kg] How I quantify: Few=3, Several=5, Many/Numerous=10, Flock = 15+

Dunn Town Rd to Dories Cove Rd. loop with brief visit to Joanne Warfel yard (wonderful bird habitat). 26 species (+1 other taxa). American Redstart 2, Yellow Warbler 15, Northern Cardinal 4. Near the end of the walk along Westside Rd. north of Dorries Cove Rd. there was an unidentified bird – showing some upper breast yellow. Lighting, angle, and distance was difficult and impossible to positively identify. Several of the group thought that it was possibly – but unlikely – a Yellow-headed Blackbird (female). But, we will never know for sure what that bird was.

But, It is wonderfully interesting to note that on May 30, 2024 Chris Blane sent this photo of a Yellowheaded Blackbird at his bird feeder (Corn Neck Rd., Block Island, RI). Yellow-headed Blackbird is a west-of-the-Mississippi species that is rarely – but regularly – seen in RI and Block Island, especially during migration seasons. Lauren Miller-Donnelly – Hi Kim, this Tuesday was probably one of my best birding mornings of the season with 65 species. Herb Hatfield is a large property in Westport owned by the Land Trust and has an oakdominated overstory, a big, restored field, it's quite large in acreage, and has a lot of forested wetlands and a fast-moving stream where Louisiana Waterthrush can be found. It is also reliable for Acadian Flycatcher and Worm-eating Warbler. Tim Mooney – Hi Kim – You predicted some new arrivals with a shift in the wind, and yes, we had a few interesting visitors in the morning. The Eastern Wood-Pewee was a real surprise; I can't ever remember hearing one in my neighborhood. There was a nice uptick in catbirds, too. But all were gone by the next day, except one catbird that apparently finds the corner of our backyard just unkempt enough to be inviting. Thanks, Tim. Cumberland, RI. <u>Tom Fetherston</u> – 21 May 2024. Good evening, Kim – No hornbills, bee-eaters or rollers this time. A decent list, but frustrating because I was getting acoustic detections of many warbler species: worm eating, northern parula, common yellowthroat, black throated green; but never was able to visually identify any. More leaves out now so that's an issue. [Yes, leaf-out definitely complicates things, especially with the aerial species. If your ear hears the bird and you can ID the species by your ear that is a legitimate recordable observation. -kg] Notes for this week:

- After last year's bluebirds nesting in a wren house here, I set out two bluebird houses on poles in the yard. Of course, neither is occupied by bluebirds :-/ One has chickadees, the other house wrens and even though they are 50' apart there are still squabbles between them.
- It appears Baltimore orioles are establishing territories. Several males chasing each other and calling.
- I saw a scarlet tanager pair earlier in the week. Spectacular, too bad they didn't check in today.

Estimates noted with an asterisk (*) Birds in the field or at the feeders were counted as singles unless present simultaneously or different sexes.
